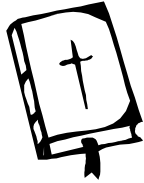

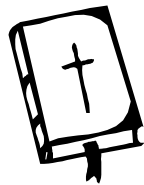

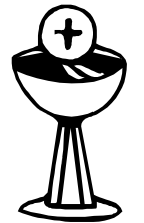

The current volunteers will be leaving UBUNTU House at the end of the summer, making way for a new group of dedicated young people. The LVC unites people of faith working for peace and justice. Every year, 90-100 volunteers commit to a year of working for social justice, living in community, and pursuing a simplified lifestyle. Volunteers staff shelters for the homeless, teach in inner-city programs, advocate for the rights of marginalized people, work to protect the environment, and much more.

I often find suggestions of connectedness where I least expect them or when I am most cynical about something. I have been going to Intiman for over 30 years and seen a lot of changes in its style and content. For the last few years, they have included a one-person show in each season. I am usually wary of these shows because typically one-person shows are self-promotion for the actor. But I have been surprised a couple of times by what Intiman has presented in their one-person productions.

The current production at Intiman Theater, The Thin Place, is one of those surprises. Based on interviews of local people who faced a major crisis in their lives, this play brings out the connections between all of us searching for God. There are 12 characters in the play, all played by a single actor, and each with a different perspective on where God is or isn't. Faith is shown in all its ambiguities. Signs from God that didn't come as expected or not at all, responses to events that caused deeper growth, questioning authority.

By being allowed a glimpse into their searching to make sense of what had happened to them I felt connected to each one, even though I hadn't experienced anything like they had. This connection is what keeps me going back to live theater. You just don't get the same experience watching a screen, where the distance between the audience and the character is greater. A well-crafted production connects the characters to audience through the actors. There is a lot of great theater in Seattle. Why not take in a play this summer?

Ballard First Lutheran Book Club

The BFL Book Club will meet on Monday, June 21st at 7pm in the church office building to discuss "Mountains Beyond Mountains" by Tracy Kidder. These books will be in the room across from Renee's office after Sunday, May 2 for sign out. It is a true and engaging story about Paul Farmer. Doctor, Harvard professor, renowned infectious-disease specialist, anthropologist, the recipient of a MacArthur "genius" grant, and world-class Robin Hood. His goal is redressing the "steep gradient of inequality" in medical service to the desperately poor. He started out establishing a complex of public health facilities on the central plateau of Haiti, and now is involved in initiatives on three continents as well as earthquake relief in Haiti. Update from the Facilities Committee

All of us are aware that the furnace has been broken for several months. The Facilities Committee has had this as their primary focus to resolve this in a way that will give us a long term solution to our heating of the Church. Up to this point the contractor has been doing demolition of unusable parts of the old system to make way for the new. Engineering of the new system is being done with high efficiency in mind to lower our energy consumption and cost to operate. The new system is on track to be complete and online in July just when we really need more heat! We have many other projects in mind for the rest of the year that involves painting, cleaning and maintaining our structures. The Committee is also developing a long term process of doing building inspections on a regular basis to be aware of any problems that may be developing.

Evangelism Made Easy

Whenever people hear "evangelism" they think of knocking on doors. This is perfectly valid but uncomfortable for most people. Think of it as a being a representative of Christ in our neighborhood and world. Here are 7 easy ways to evangelize:

1. Be Kind to Your Neighbors. Bring them a card when they are sick. Take them a meal when they have babies, have a death or when you think they might need it. Check up on your elderly neighbors.
2. Attend Church. You need to be active in your church to represent it.
3. Obey God's Word, Read and Study the Bible. People always ask questions about your faith. Be ready to answer.
4. Minister to Others. Listen to others. Pray with and for them.
5. Invite People to Church. Be open about where you go and what we have to offer.
6. Be a Part of the Community. Keep your church active in the needs and activities of the community.
7. Greet People at Church. Be open and welcoming to new people. Make sure they are comfortable. Invite them to coffee hour. Also, greet and talk to people who you see on Sundays but don't know.

Some of these are easier than others to do. Just pick a few and try them. Soon you will be on your way to being a great evangelist.

Proposed BFL Bylaw Changes re: Endowment Funds Disbursement – Again!

On March 1, 2009, the BFL Congregation voted to change the BFL bylaws adding to Section XII., regarding the Ballard First Lutheran Endowment Fund, after part C.3. The goal was to carry out the intent of the congregational vote in 2004 to protect the principal investment of the Fund while providing sustainable, reliable gifts to Fund Recipients. The BFL Endowment committee in reviewing historical disbursements and the 2009 bylaw change discovered that the language change does not allow disbursements to be consistent with what they have been in the past, approximately \$10,000, per year. The language below will. The Endowment committee has voted and approved the following proposed changes to the bylaws. The next step is for the BFL Church Council to vote and approve the proposed changes, and then for the Congregation to vote.

Prior to approving the proposed changes below, the Endowment committee looked at local and federal law to answer the question if endowment fund disbursements were limited to earnings. The Endowment committee learned that the principal of an endowment fund can be tapped into for disbursements. Specifically, the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act of 2006 (UPMIFA) is recent federal legislation governing management of endowment funds. Washington has adopted its own legislation based on the federal legislation. It allows for disbursement of the principal of endowment funds under comprehensive prudent standards relating to the whole economic situation of the charitable institution.

Not only do the proposed bylaw changes meet with endowment fund best practices according to federal and state law, it also is appropriate and consistent with Thrivent's guide to disbursement of endowment funds and will allow the BFL Endowment Committee to remain consistent in its yearly disbursement of funds.

Below are the current BFL church bylaws in parenthesis and bold with the proposed changes underlined and in bold. The changes would be added to Section XII., The Ballard First Lutheran Endowment Fund, after part C.3. In a nutshell, recommended distribution would be 3.5% of the fund balance (proposed language) vs. 5% of the earnings (current language.)

“C.4 If the Principal Balance of the fund is greater than \$180,000, the Directors will oversee the distribution of **3.5%** (**five (5) percent**) of a four (4) year Average **Fund Balance** of the (**Total Return of the**) Fund, unless the percentage is changed by a vote of the congregation. The Principal Balance is defined as the total Fund value at the end of the previous calendar year. (**The Total Return is defined as dividends + interest + capital appreciation.**)

5. The Average to be used for distributions made through December 31, 2012 will be calculated using the Average **Fund Balance** (**Total Return**) for January 1, 2004 through December 31, 2007. The same formula will be used in following four year cycles.

6. No Changes.

7. The Directors will consider all suggestions and determine the annual recipients by majority vote of the Directors. The Directors may choose to make long-term commitments to recipients that continue for up to four years (e.g. scholarships). In that case, the Directors will distribute the remainder of the **3.5%** (**5%**) of the (**Total**) **Average Fund Balance** (**Return**) to other recipients who qualify for the remaining allocation categories.

Please review the proposed bylaw changes set forth above and come to the Special Congregational meeting immediately following worship on Sunday, June 20th.
